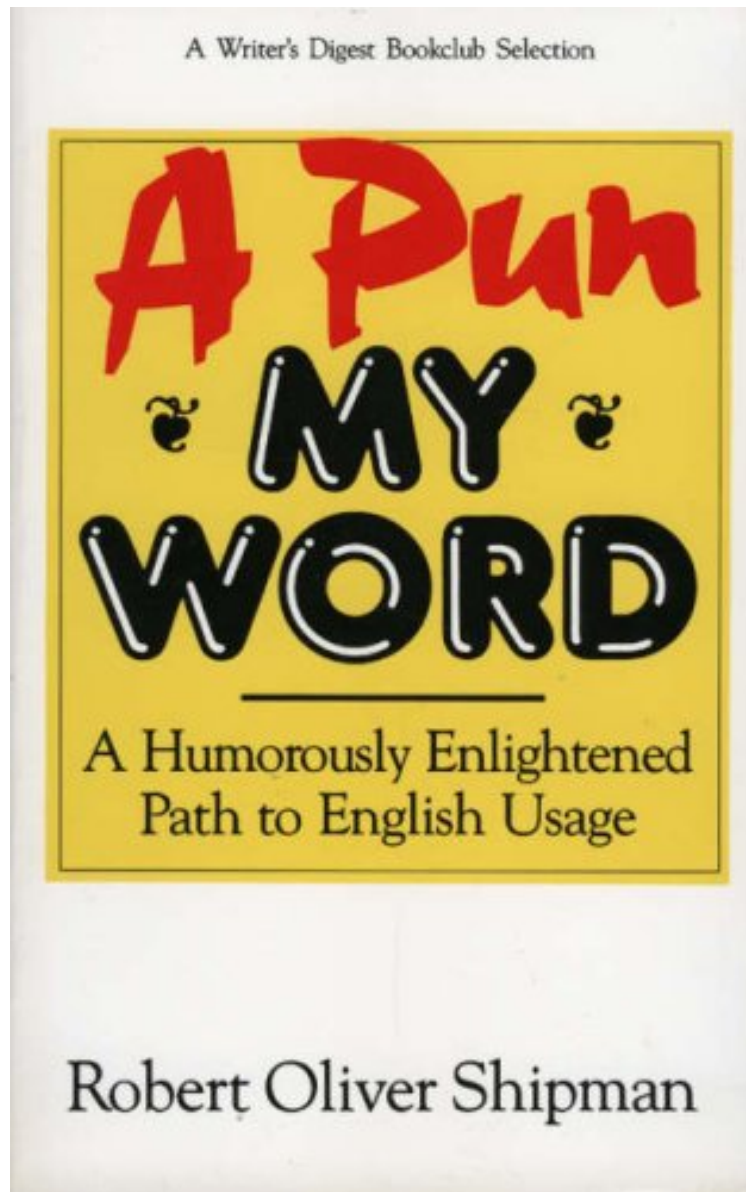

one might reasonably presume this book to be more clever or funny than it actually is. It *is* a useful reference for disambiguating easily confused words, although some of the examples are better than others in highlighting the distinctions. Don't expect too much punning, though.

This entertaining and informative handbook deals with hundreds of difficult or misunderstood words-pairs and groups of words which are troublesome, misused, or abused. Drawing on a lifetime love affair with words, teacher, scholar, and professional communicator Robert Oliver Shipman explains their difficulty or confused use in clear, concise prose, identifies their parts of speech, defines their meanings, and illustrates their correct use through witty and humorous examples. *A Pun My Word* shows that words can be used with both the preciseness of a surgeon and the wittiness of a jester. From *Library Journal* This prescriptive, somewhat old-fashioned handbook on usage emphasizes correct word choice (compose / comprise / consist / include, decimate / demolish / destroy, obscenity / profanity / vulgarity) and warns against confusion (mendacity / mendacity, loath / loathe, tortuous / torturous). However, hair / heir, voyageur / voyeur, immunity / impunity hardly need clearing up. Some entries are not well explained (the difference between journey and voyage, for example), and some rely too much on a knowledge of grammar (clauses, case, verbals), although a glossary of terms helps. Using characters such as Luke Warm, Ava Rice, and Tab Lloyd, this book is fun, if a bit sexist, but it is not complete enough to be a good reference. - Kitty Chen Dean, Nassau Coll., Garden City, N.Y.
