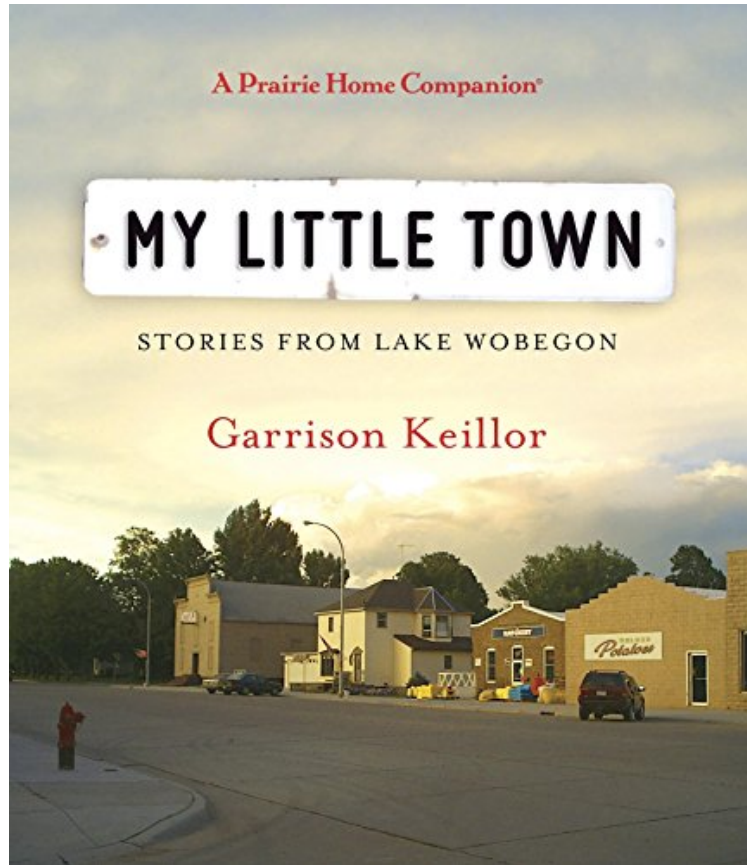

Disappointing By Middle-Aged Professor Garrison Keillor has been a master storyteller and an American treasure for decades, but this collection of "Lake Wobegone" monologues is only a pale shadow of his previous recordings. There are occasional bright spots, such as "Tundra Swans," but most of these stories have neither the folk wisdom nor the wry humor that have been Keillor's trademarks. This collection relies too much upon the extension of previous material and upon Junior High School

humor, including a puerile fascination with flatulence. Hopefully Keillor will rejuvenate his talent, otherwise I'd stick with the earlier collections.
