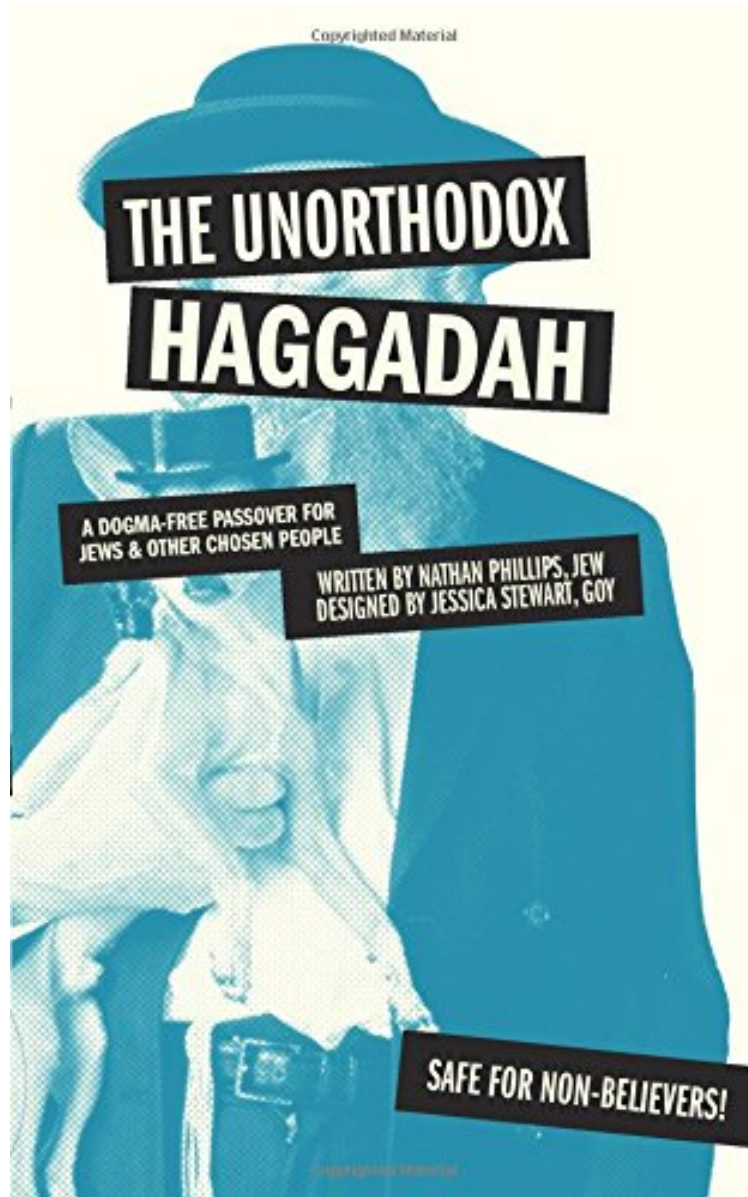

It provides spiritual guidance for Pesach, and tells the story without being heavy on the Hashem, so to speak. I am not sure I would use it to have a Seder with, but some of the ideas and suggestions could be incorporated into a Seder, albeit not a strictly traditional one. I collect Haggadahs and this is one I will add to my permanent collection.
